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MESSAGE

Disaster Risk Reduction is not a choice but it is inevitable for making society safe and keeping flow of development gains uninterrupted. NIDM has got the foundation stone laid of its new campus at Rohini by Shri Kiren Rijiju, Hon'ble Minister of State, Home, Ministry of Home Affairs, is one step forward towards strengthening institutional system for capacity building in DRR.
