Background of the Programme

Globally, disaster management has become an important stream in various professional and non-professional educational courses and practice. Disaster management aims at reducing or avoiding potential losses from a disaster event, assure prompt and appropriate assistance to the survivors, and achieve rapid and effective recovery. Within the disaster management cycle and concept disaster preparedness for disaster risk reduction are an essential aspect. Within the whole cycle of disaster management community is one of the most important stakeholders to adopt, imbibe and evaluate the same. Thus, the community become self-reliant, confident and empowered to deal with the disasters and similar eventualities. Disaster management is the responsibility of all stakeholders in the society including governmental/non-governmental organizations and people themselves. Imparting and disseminating the knowledge of disaster management is essential for building knowledge, attitude and skills to engage various stakeholders in managing the disaster risks. Thus, community-based disaster preparedness is most crucial in this direction.

This workshop aims at providing an understanding about community based disaster preparedness and further elaborate on various elements of disaster management and disaster preparedness with some of the basic skills required for working in the disaster management sector. The frequency and impact of disasters are on a rise from the past few decades. In the 1970s number of natural disasters recorded annually was 69 against 420 per year in 2010s (Statista, 2020) in India. Same trend follows in South Asia Region (SAR) as well, where number of disasters per year has increased sevenfold over the past few decades as per the statistics maintained by EM-DAT (EMDAT, CRED / UCLouvain, Brussels, Belgium, 2020). This has led to the situation where government, donors, and private sectors have increased their allocation for raising awareness related to disaster vulnerability and exposure as well as other risk reduction measures.

Thus, there is a need for more focused efforts on improving stakeholder's awareness and actions that reduce the vulnerabilities and increase the disaster management capacities of the communities. Minimizing the exposure of the population to disaster risks through structural mitigation activities is an integral component of CBDRR. Thus, CBDRR leads to improved disaster preparedness measures among the community and strengthening institutional structures for disaster response. The Community based Disaster Preparedness training programme provides an opportunity for field practitioners, students to learn essential skills and knowledge in community-based disaster preparedness to address implementation challenges in a systematic manner. The participants will acquire tools and obtain knowledge on "how to" design and implement programs for reducing disaster risks and vulnerability and building community capacity.

In this context, the National Institute of Disaster Management (NIDM), in collaboration with M.R Nathwani College of Arts, is organizing a 3-day training programme on **"Community Based Disaster Preparedness & Management"** from **January 31, 2022 to February 2, 2022**, from **11:00 am to 1:00 pm**, to build the capacity and resilience of the community in disasters.

- To comprehend the concept of disaster management, disaster risk reduction and risk management
- To build awareness about the concept of disaster resiliency within disaster management

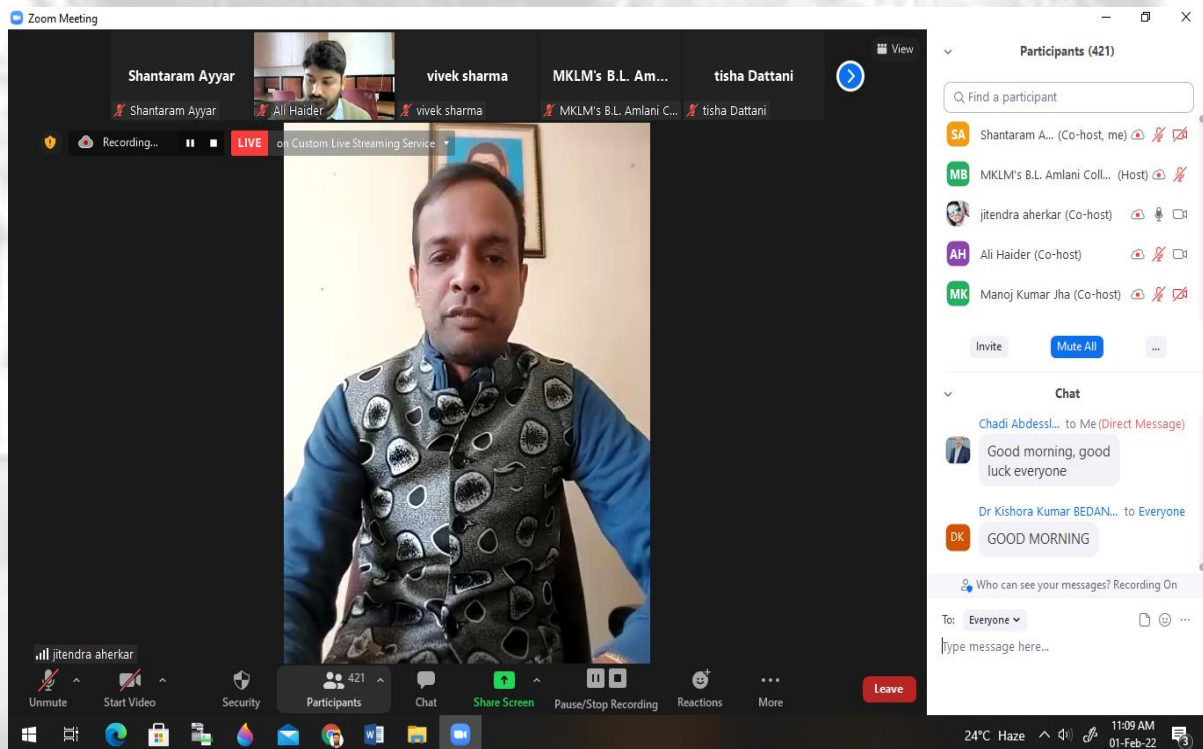
INAUGURAL SESSION

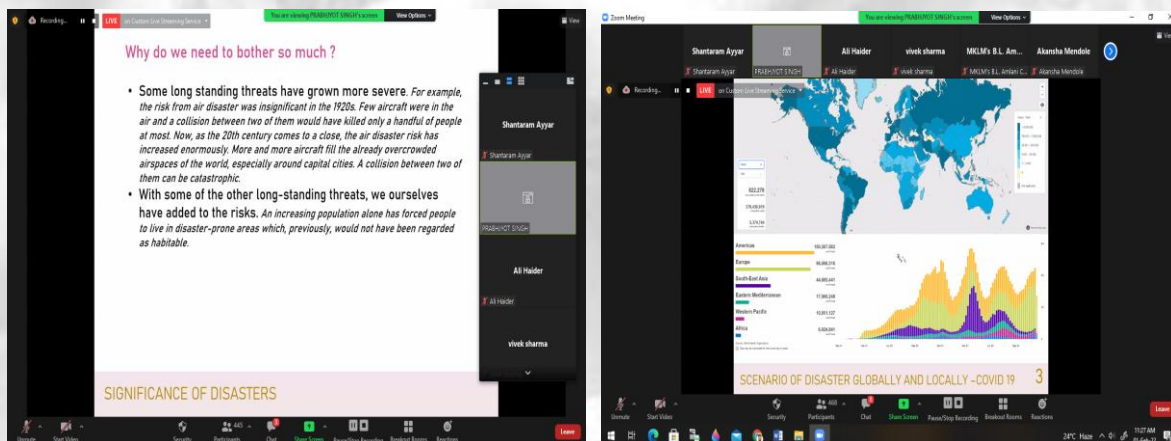
LECTURE – 1

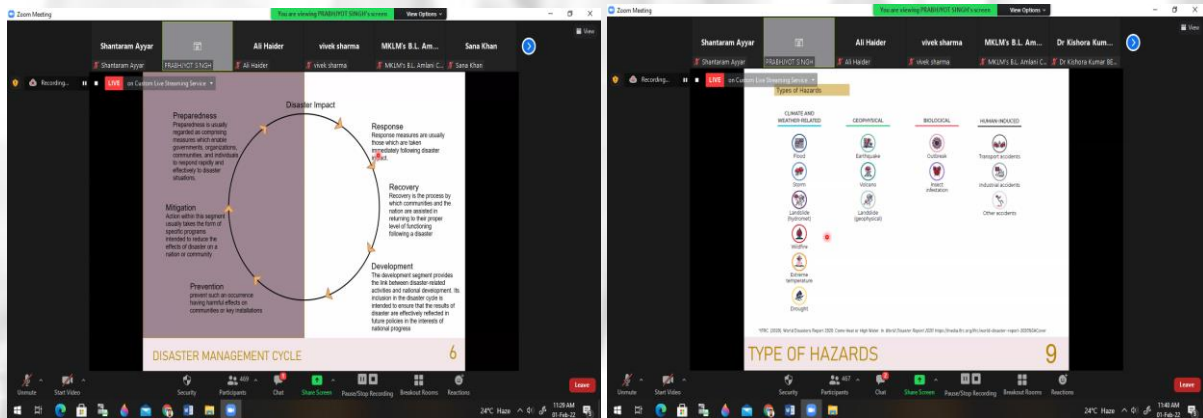
Topic: Basics of Disaster Management and Disaster Risk Reduction Process

Speaker: Mr. Prabhjyot Singh, Young Professional, NIDM

Mr. Prabhjyot Singh began with introducing the concept of disaster and the basics of disaster management. He further talks about the need to bother about disasters, measures to deal with disasters, the need to take timely action so that we don't have to face the adverse effects of it and can manage the situation. Citing examples of India facing both an Earthquake and a Drought, he states the possible solution for overcoming them in the future for which an advanced level of mechanism is needed. He explained the concept of global disasters, the necessary action to be followed and various mitigation measures to be adopted in the initial stage to minimize the effects. In addition to this, he elaborates on disaster preparedness that enables us to face such uncertain events. He also states about the various risks that we have added making it an alarming situation and therefore we need to go to the grass-root level and figure out various alternatives to avoid situations. The on-going pandemic has been an uncertain event that continues to have a dreadful impact on the entire world but it teaches us how awareness and basic practicing measures can save so many lives.

To maintain the quality of life for all, irrespective of their background various labourers or workers do not have access to many facilities which are required. India has a massive labour force where female's contribution is much lower as compared to men. Disaster management must be taken as an opportunity to overcome the situation and we being together as a community has to make sure that it should not occur again.





Key Discussion Points:

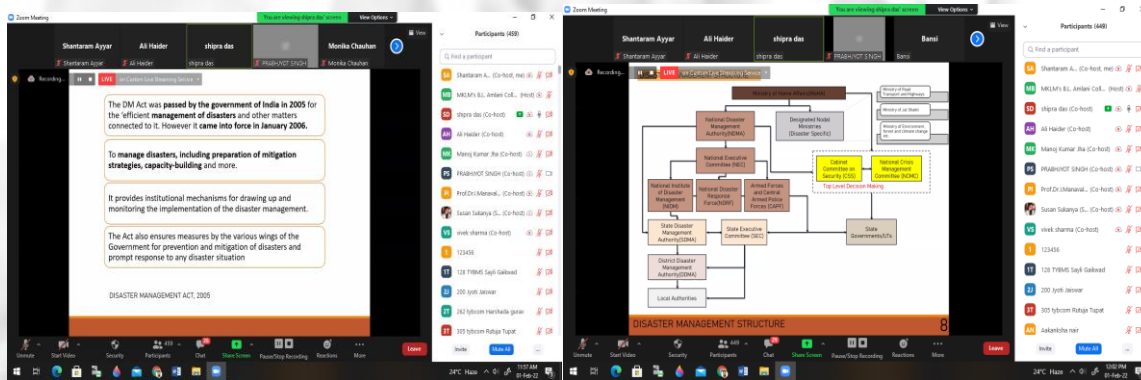
- A hazard is any source of potential damage, hard or adverse health issue on something or someone.
- Whenever any disaster happens we need to respond to that first, then the recovery steps begin later on.
- Vulnerability is multi-dimensional in nature.
- Hazard and Vulnerability situation of India.
- Gender and social vulnerability of the society increase the risk.
- Weak and Poor are a major sufferers during and after the disaster.

LECTURE – 2

Topic: DM Institutions, System and Law

Speaker: Ms. Shipra Das, Young Professional, NIDM

Ms. Shipra Das opens her talk by pointing out how the disaster scenario can be cruel and sometimes has no strong effect. She then states that our Prime Minister has taken major steps to understand and evaluate the disaster problem and what could be the emerging techniques or mechanisms of disaster management. She highlighted the Disaster Management Act, 2005 and its various objectives and provisions. Various committees, authority bodies like the State & Central Govt. have been involved in this process to assess the impact of disasters and provide institutional mechanisms and monitor the implementation of the disaster management act. She also briefly explains the structure of disaster management in our country which comes under Ministry of Home affairs where NDMA is the nodal central body responsible for providing a framework of the plans and policies in order to respond effectively to the disaster situation. She further describes the role and responsibilities of various supporting committees and agencies in the hierarchy of the structure. She mentions about the never-say-die attitude of our armed forces and central armed police forces have helped to block the manmade disaster outside the country. Our NDRF plays crucial role to find out vulnerable group, provides immediate first aid and moral support by coordinating with other agencies. Other institutions like IRS, NCDNFSC (National Fire Service College), Nagpur also play an important role in capacity development and training the workforce.



Key Discussion Points:

- Hazards are earlier measure while disaster is something happened drastically in uncontrollable manner.
- Disaster only happens when people are part of it or else only hazards could be seen in surroundings.
- People are one of the reason for disaster; all because of their good and bad practices.
- Major initiatives were being taken by Prime Minister and various authorities to analyse and rectify the provisional scenario.
- Arm forces made stronger to block external manmade disasters
- Different committee has been appointed to work on the disaster related issues
- Courses begin to learn the precaution measures
- NIDM's focus on necessary areas to understand the better picture

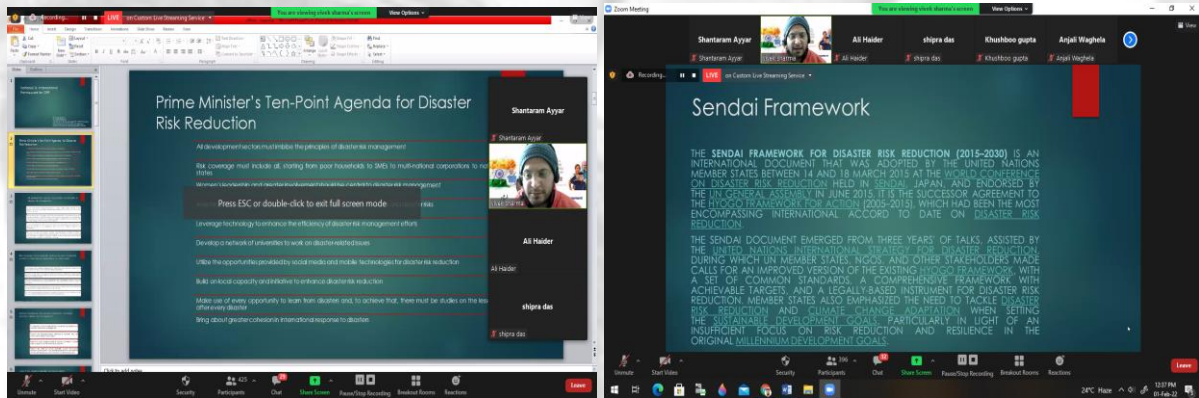
LECTURE – 3

Topic: Basics of Disaster Management and Disaster Risk Reduction Process

Speaker: Mr. Vivek Sharma, Young Professional, NIDM

Mr. Vivek Sharma began the discussion with national and international framework for Disaster Risk Reduction and management. He explained Prime Minister's Ten-Point Agenda for Disaster Risk Reduction scenario that gave us a detailed idea and knowledge on various aspects mentioned like:- developmental sectors must imbibe the principles of disaster management, India's technique to manage and find out the uncertain events that work in an advanced way with all upcoming disaster mechanism, women played a significant role and their greater participation observed in disaster risk reduction. Mr. Vivek finds the need to invest in risk mapping globally to improve nature and disaster risk. Our authorities brought advance leverage technology to enhance the efficiency of disaster risk management; proper network must develop between universities to work collaboratively in concern issues. Rational mentality must utilize the opportunities provided by social media and mobile technologies to help each other in need. Necessarily local capacities bring forward and initiative should build to enhance disaster risk management. After each disaster there comes a new opportunity to restructure our learning programs to bring some new ideology from it.

In addition to this, he speaks about Sendai Framework that is an international document for Disaster Risk Reduction (2015-2030) and the global targets to be achieved such as to reduce global disaster mortality, number of effected people and bring early alarm system. Further, he concludes by stretching importance of wide committees such as United Nations International Strategy for Disaster Risk Reduction, United Nations Disaster Management Team, United Nations Disaster Assessment and Coordination.



Key Discussion Points:

- Prime Minister's Agenda for disaster risk reduction, policies analyses and save life of people with early precautions.
- Disaster is a problem but we human need to find a solution which could help to mitigate the impact of the upcoming uncertain events
- Leverage technologies to be brought forward to access the societal variants
- Reconstruction and Rehabilitation in Disaster management should be enacted
- India's technology to face disasters are not so advance which need to in-build technical segment into it.
- Sendai framework and betterment out of the framed policy.

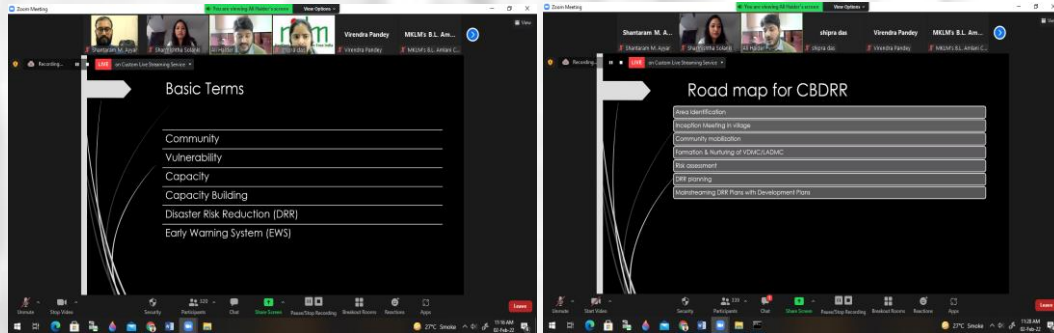
LECTURE – 1

Topic: Basics of Community based Disaster Management and Disaster Risk Reduction Process

Speaker: Mr. Ali Haider, Junior Consultant, NIDM

Mr. Ali Haider had begun the session by highlighting theme on community which consist of people with common interests living in a particular area broadly. A group of people with a common characteristic or interest living together within a larger society. He observed that vulnerability is their inability of a group to resist hazard or to respond when a disaster has occurred. Appropriate accessibility brought to enhance the capacity that directly improves the methodology for dealing disaster risk reduction measures. Disaster Risk Reduction is a technique to manage a shocking uncertain and least expected events. An advance early warning system must be installed to analyse the unfavourable and unexpected act of man and nature.

CBDRR: Is the process whereby community systematically manage its disaster risk to a certain level. Their calculation says community is the first respondent towards the disaster rather than any other management, their ideas can reduce the economic loss to certain extent; lives can be saved before disaster occurs, and immediate care can take after occurring it. We can achieve our goal in easiest way by jointly working in required manner. Road mapping for CBDRR which include area identification, inception meeting in village, community mobilization, formation and nurturing, risk assessment, mainstreaming DRR etc. He says we need to strengthen the State Disaster Response Fund, increase the number of cyclone shelter. And finally explained about Aapda Mitra community and their keen volunteers contributed in various capacity building measures in society.



Key Discussion Points:

- Community work with its interest towards the better living.
- Vulnerability and their inability to resist their unwanted events around them.
- Life could be saved by proper measures taken at right time.
- Road Map to CBDRR and their various contribution towards society.
- Lesson learnt after every disaster and improvement made to overcome certain things in future.
- Sustainable goals can be achieved if measures are taken in timely manner.
- Different community and the volunteers support to protecting each other.
- Early warning measures to analyse the scenario.

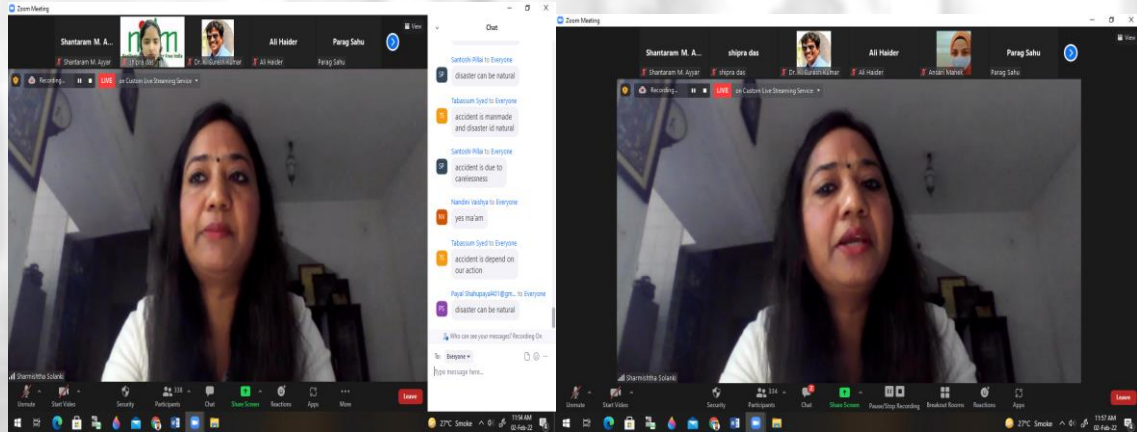
LECTURE – 2

Topic: Process of Community Level Disaster Management Plan

Speaker: Ms. Sharmishtha Solanki, Freelancer, Disaster Management

Ms. Sharmishtha Solanki commences her talk on Risk which could be consciously decided whether to accept or to reject. Sometimes acting foolish make the group vulnerable there the victim or sufferer is not aware about the situation and unwantedly becomes a part of it. Commonly accidents are uncertainty or unavoidable which can be avoided by certain extent by taking right precautions. Accidents basically depends on once action which could be conscious or unconscious, several points to bring during disaster must began with rescuing the people of that particular area; then preparedness ideas need to offer which enhance once knowledge to learn and handle upcoming disaster. She says disaster reduction measures or techniques must know to people who are the permanent resident of that zone, people living in that certain place should be completely aware about the good and bad of locality to take measure in uncertain times.

As of now always keep the essential items ready to handle the unexpected events, enhance once capacity to avoid the large amount of destruction. A well alert and strong mentality must be created among the citizens. In practical not only the authority but also a common people must take active part in mitigating them. While constructing road, building, dams, bridges various measures to be considered to eradicate any future unpredictable events. An early warning system should be built in to notify time after time as a precautionary perspective.



Key Discussion Points:

- Risk can be accepted or rejected depends upon the smartness of that dealers.
- Acting foolish can cause to vulnerable or painful situation.
- Insufficient knowledge must be enlightened with proper ideas and knowledge to safeguard ourselves.
- Precautions measures like essential items need to be arranged in systematic manner to work proper and execute right.
- Accidents can be avoided by proper alert of human act with advance techniques.
- Disasters can be minimized to certain level if appropriate alarm system has been made.
- An early warning system should be built to alert the people.
- Then preparedness to enhance once knowledge and make them ready to face future scenario.

LECTURE – 3

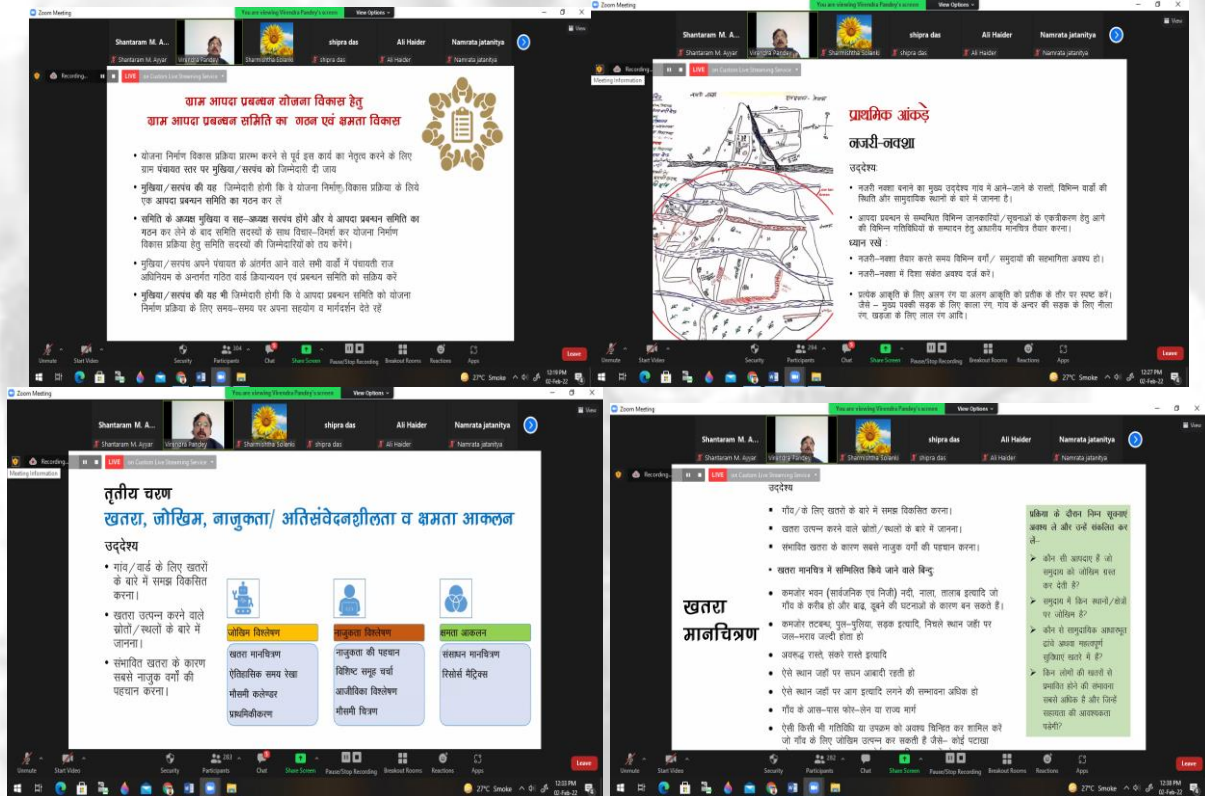
Topic: Process of Community Level Disaster Management Plan

Speaker: Mr. Virendra Kumar Pandey, Consultant, Resilient Village Programme, UNICEF

Mr. Virendra Kumar Pandey unfolded his thought on the disaster management committee which must be formed so that people and various authorities could be a part of it E.g. Doctors, Government officers and well sophisticated people. We need to build a positive mentality among the people to maintain a good bond and understanding with them, community is the best disaster supporter rather than any other supporting system. The primary and secondary plays important role that can be used to analyse the structure of entire scenario. Primary data gathered from various mode and secondary data basically gathered from government records, which says women, children and aged are considered as vulnerable and victimized group. So a right planning should be inculcated to avoid the uncertainties.

Disaster management plan can be made upon the necessity and variants unexpected event and with that accordance management can bring new and innovative techniques. Precaution plays a vital role for looking at disaster situation as a well-planned program

can block huge uncertainties. Post Disaster planning is needed in order to rebuild the community and bring everything to normal.



Key Discussion Points:

- Disaster management committee must be initiated where people and authority can collaborate and make better decision.
- Repo building and creating positive mentality among the people is necessary to mingle with them and understanding their situation.
- Community is the best disaster responder compared to any other responders.
- Both primary and secondary data are crucial to understand the disaster procedural measures
- Unplugging the thought of discriminating gender and bringing equality among all.
- Precaution plays a very important role for looking at disaster situation.
- Well preparedness plan should be enacted to set an alarm system to understand uncontrolled act of man and nature.
- Disasters could not be similar to every group that depends upon their involvement with their techniques to overcome from that scene.

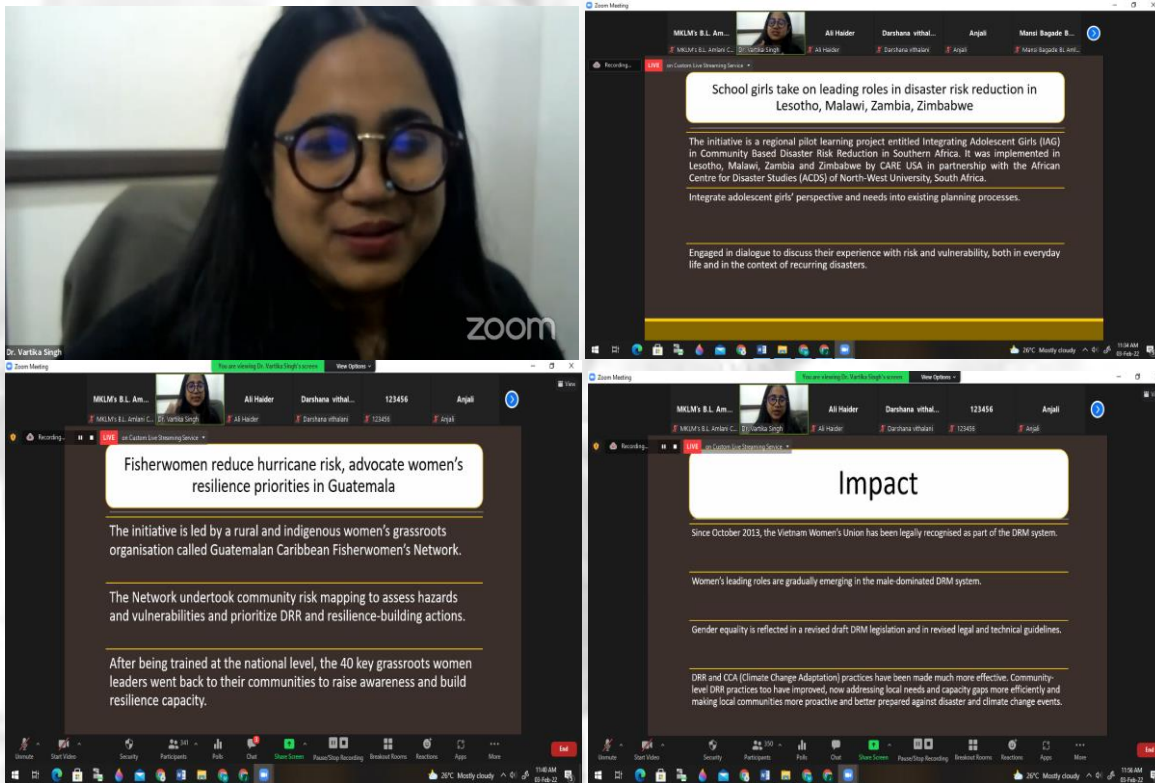


LECTURE – 1

Topic: Community participation and Women Leadership

Speaker: Dr. Vartika, Lecturer, IIM Rohtak

Dr. Vartika begins her session focusing on Women as an integral part of community. Due to the socio-economic conditions, cultural beliefs, traditional practices, women are more impacted due to structural inequality. Also, they are more vulnerable in prospect of resources distributed and not as weaker than men. As per the study, the data shows how women are more impacted by disasters in a different way. This can be further explained with the example of Cyclone which took place in Bangladesh in 1991 and the Myanmar Nargis cyclone which took place in 2008. As per the survey, the fatality rate was more for women and therefore, researchers felt that there has to be a special focus on them when it came to disaster management. She further states that the stereotype mentality of our society and prevailing culture does not encourage them to participate and be leaders. As per the study, there are very few women members on the panel of disaster management team and this is reason she highlights about women leadership. In actual women are often strong networkers, managers, organizers, caretakers in the community. But however, when we talk about disaster at higher level and one who take decisions are tends to be men. She further defines Disaster Risk Reduction as a fundamental pillar of sustainable development and requires “All of society inclusive approach” where women equally represent leadership position when it comes to various roles of DRR, evacuation, policy making etc. She mentions various case studies which show the changing role of women and how their participation can bring a huge change in the community. Concluding her speech she feels how women need to be actively participate in governance and political processes, include their perspectives into decision making which will redefine the role of gender equality. Empowered women groups can take stronger and sustainable initiatives and women leadership has helped to build resilience through increased social capital.



Key Discussion Points:

- Tracing the interlink between gender and environment is necessary in today's world.
- Offering theoretical perspective to this debate before practical engagement.
- Contextualizing the disasters in relation to agriculture, food and energy.
- Women as a change agent of grassroots and their contribution must be considered during unhealthy situation.
- Understanding the Eco-feminism and the effectiveness towards the requirement of the society irrespective of their gender.
- Environmental concern towards the gender and unplugging.
- Approaches of Indian context with an innovative technique of handling bad situation.
- Non-bias equation between genders and equal distribution of resources.

- Enactment of laws and policies for easing the various scenarios.

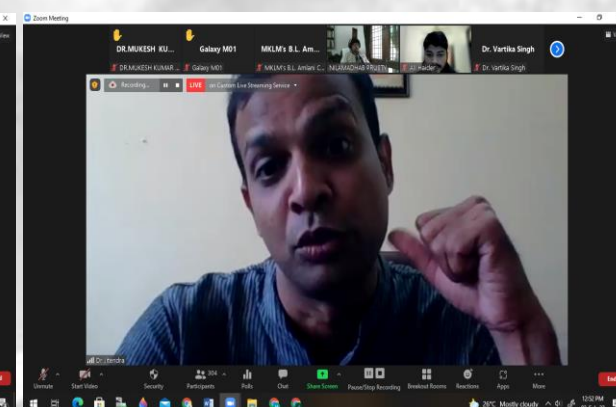
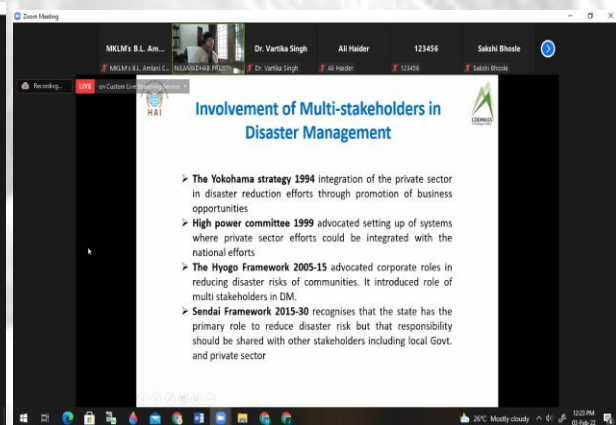
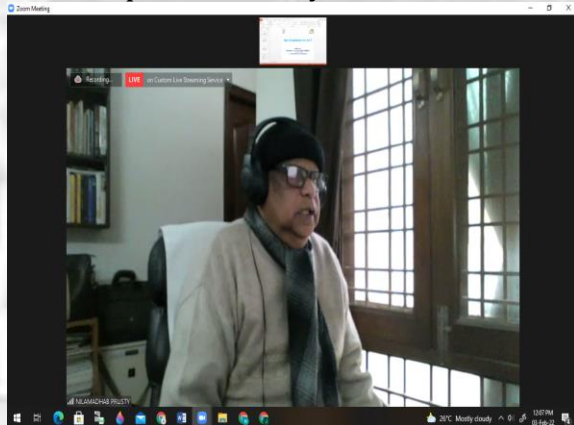
LECTURE – 2

Topic: Role of Stakeholders in CBDP

Speaker: Dr. Nilamadhab Prusty, HAI, Vision Spring and CDDMASS

Aims:

Dr. Nilamadhav Prusty Sir commences his lecture by highlighting the importance of various stakeholders in community based disaster preparedness. The stakeholders might be individuals or organisations which may contribute, be affected by or be a part of the planning, response and recovery from an emergency situation. In his view, humans cannot completely stop the disaster but can be able to save life and mitigate to a certain level, where the effect could be less. He believes disasters can be overcome with quick response to it. How quick the response can be provided will decide the effect to the level of its extent. And then the part comes to recovery or to rebuild the scenario. However research says women are more affected by the disaster because of the lack of exploration, untrained to handle the circumstance. It also shows a great disparity among the victims who lost their life, where 30% were men and 70% were women. He then elaborates on the various stakeholders involved in the disaster preparedness process such as: Community, NGO's, corporate houses, Donor/Bilateral agencies, etc. He concludes by saying proper assistance is needed in framing reduction strategies and conversation programmes. There must be adequate focus and guidance on disaster management, awareness drive in the community, training and motivation, evacuation to safe places along with moral support and coordination amongst various stakeholders in order to provide timely relief measures.

- Civil society is not only the NGO's but also the other eager contributors towards society
- Safety process is given more priority.

- Donor and Bilateral Agencies plays an active and prominent role to help in the uncertain scenario.

- Education on hazards and disasters management is needed to inculcate new ideas of understanding the unwanted situation.
