1. Introduction

India's vast and diverse geography, combined with its dense population, makes it highly susceptible to a wide range of natural and human-induced disasters. Over the past few decades, the frequency and intensity of these events have surged, posing significant threats to human lives, infrastructure, ecosystems, and livelihoods. The country remains exposed to multiple hazards, including floods, cyclones, earthquakes, droughts, landslides, and industrial accidents. These challenges underscore the urgent need to enhance disaster preparedness, mitigation, response, and recovery efforts across all levels of governance and sectors.

Climate change is further compounding India's disaster risk profile, amplifying the severity and unpredictability of extreme weather events. Escalating temperatures have resulted in more frequent and prolonged heatwaves, erratic monsoon behavior, and heavy rainfall episodes, which in turn lead to severe urban flooding. Coastal areas are grappling with rising sea levels and more intense cyclonic storms, causing displacement, erosion, and infrastructure damage. In the Himalayan region, accelerated glacial melt is contributing to flash floods, landslides, and glacial lake outburst floods. The agriculture sector is increasingly vulnerable to unseasonal rainfall and persistent droughts, threatening food security and rural livelihoods. Public health is also at risk, with a growing incidence of vector-borne diseases. These evolving risks demand the urgent implementation of climate-adaptive and disaster-resilient strategies, including robust early warning systems, climate-smart infrastructure, and community-based preparedness.

According to the National Disaster Management Authority's 2022–23 Annual Report, 27 of India's 36 States and Union Territories are disaster-prone. Approximately 58.6% of the country's land area is vulnerable to earthquakes, 12% is flood-prone, and 5,700 km of the 7,516 km coastline is susceptible to cyclones and tsunamis. Additionally, 68% of the cultivable land is at risk of drought, and nearly 15% of the land—primarily in hilly regions—is prone to landslides. Between 2000 and 2025, India has experienced numerous major disasters, resulting in considerable loss of life, economic disruption, and damage to critical infrastructure.

India's geographic diversity—spanning the Himalayas, long coastlines, vast plains, and arid regions—coupled with a growing population, intensifies its disaster risk profile. In FY 2024–25 alone, India recorded 3,080 deaths from natural disasters, marking an 18 % increase from the 2,616 fatalities in 2023–24 and the highest toll in 11 years. This surge underscores the compounding influence of climate change on seasonal hazards. For instance, a landslide in Kerala in July 2024 claimed over 50 lives, while Delhi faced catastrophic urban flooding

following extreme heat and monsoon rainfall. Such incidents reflect a broader trend of intensifying extreme events, signaling urgent need for robust risk reduction and preparedness strategies.

From a hazard-exposure standpoint, India continues to be highly vulnerable. Nearly 59% of the country's landmass is classified as being at moderate to very high risk of earthquakes. Around 12% (approximately 40 million hectares) is prone to flooding and river erosion, while nearly 5,700 km of India's 7,516 km-long coastline is exposed to cyclones and tsunamis. Additionally, about 68% of cultivable land is vulnerable to drought, and an estimated 12–13% of the terrain primarily in hilly regions is at risk of landslides. A district-level assessment conducted in December 2024 identified 51 districts as facing "very high" flood risk and 91 districts as being at "very high" drought risk, with 11 districts exposed to both hazards.

2. Impact on Specially-abled and Marginalized Group

Disasters in India disproportionately affect those who are already vulnerable women, children, persons with disabilities, senior citizens, and the poorest communities. In flood-prone regions like Assam's Dhemaji, recurrent climate-induced displacement places immense caregiving and income-burden on women and the elderly, who are often left managing households alone while male members migrate for work. Children face heightened risks of malnutrition, disease, and school disruption, especially in crowded relief camps lacking basic protections. New evidence from urban India shows persons with disabilities experience 2–4 times higher mortality rates during acute disasters, driven by limited physical mobility, inaccessible evacuation infrastructure, and discrimination during rescue efforts. Senior citizens, too, endure life-threatening health risks when isolated or without support, while the poor—often residing in informal settlements—are most exposed to structural collapse, loss of livelihood, and exploitation, including gender-based violence. These patterns emphasize the urgent need for inclusive disaster policies, accessible shelters, social protection coverage, and targeted outreach to ensure dignity and safety for all.

4. Rationale

Given India's high vulnerability to a range of natural and anthropogenic hazards intensified by climate change—it is imperative to build a robust, inclusive, and forward-looking disaster risk management (DRM) framework. The recurring loss of lives, widespread displacement, and economic damage underscore significant gaps in disaster preparedness, especially at the local and institutional levels. The increasing incidence of compound disasters such as heatwaves followed by urban flooding, or landslides triggered by glacial melt calls for a strategic, multidisciplinary understanding of evolving risk patterns. A structured training programme that strengthens capacity in risk identification, mitigation planning, climate-adaptive infrastructure, and community-based preparedness is essential. This programme should align with the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction and national DRM priorities, enabling participants to translate policy into practice effectively.

Moreover, the disproportionate impact of disasters on women, children, persons with disabilities, the elderly, and economically marginalized communities highlights the urgent need for equity-based and people-centered disaster management approaches. Vulnerable groups often face barriers to accessing early warnings, relief, and rehabilitation services due to systemic exclusions and inadequate planning. A specialized training program will equip government officials, humanitarian workers, and civil society actors with the tools and perspectives needed to mainstream inclusion into disaster policies, programs, and interventions. It will also foster cross-sectoral collaboration and provide hands-on strategies for developing resilient livelihoods, psychosocial support systems, and inclusive evacuation and shelter planning. Through capacity building, this course will contribute toward building a disaster-resilient India where no one is left behind.

5. Aim

To build capacities of disaster management professionals, trainers, and social sector stakeholders to understand, plan, and implement inclusive and community-based disaster risk reduction strategies, with a focus on enhancing resilience among children, women, persons with disabilities, elderly, transgender persons, and other marginalized groups vulnerable to disasters.

6. Course Objectives



⇒ Understand key concepts and systems in disaster management.

Learn the basics of disaster types, policies, and how disaster management works in India and globally.

⇒ Learn to assess risks and prepare inclusive disaster plans.

Gain skills in identifying risks and creating plans that include the needs of vulnerable groups.

⇒ Improve response and recovery skills for all communities.

Learn how to respond to emergencies and help communities recover, with focus on inclusion.

⇒ Support and protect children, women, and marginalized groups.

Understand how to keep vulnerable people safe and promote their role in disaster resilience.

⇒ Encourage teamwork and local participation in disaster risk reduction.

Work with volunteers, communities, and institutions to build stronger, safer societies.

7. Target Group

The programme is designed for entry- to mid-level officers (Group A and B) from Central, State, and Local Governments, including personnel from SDMAs, DDMAs, ATIs, universities, and other institutions involved in disaster management. Given the programme's emphasis on vulnerable populations, participants are also encouraged from the Department of Women and Child Development, Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, Department of Social Justice and Empowerment, Department of Tribal Affairs, Department of Minority Affairs, Department of Education, and Department of Rural Development.

8. Methodology

The methodology of the Two-Week Comprehensive Training Course on Disaster Risk Management is designed to provide a practical, participatory and immersive learning experience that aligns with national policies and international frameworks.

- a) **Blended Learning Approach-** The course adopts a blend of instructional strategies to ensure theoretical grounding and practical understanding. These include:
- **Expert Lectures:** Delivered by domain experts, government officials, and academics on core topics in disaster risk management.
- **Panel Discussions:** Multi-stakeholder dialogues exploring challenges and innovations in DRM.
- Case Study Analysis: Focused on real-world examples such as the 2013 Uttarakhand floods, 2021 Rishiganga flash floods, and cyclone response efforts.

b) Experiential and Participatory Learning

- **Group Activities**: Simulations and role-playing exercises to encourage teamwork and real-time problem-solving.
- **Interactive Sessions:** Facilitated Q&A, scenario-based drills, and participatory brainstorming.
- **Hands-On Exercises:** Activities such as mock disaster response, field mapping, and disaster preparedness planning.

c) Technology-Enabled Training

- **Use of GIS, RS, and UAVs:** Training on risk assessment tools and hazard mapping.
- Multimedia Tools: Use of awareness films, documentaries, and digital content to enhance engagement and comprehension.


d) Field Exposure and Demonstrations

- **Field Visits:** To NDRF, IMD, and NCS.
- Live Demonstrations: Emergency response techniques (e.g., fire

safety, search and rescue) conducted by professional services like the AP Fire Service, NDRF.

- Technology based demonstartions- SACHET, NDEM, IDRN, NDMIS
- **e) Structured Module Progression-** The programme is divided into 10 comprehensive modules, each building progressively on participants' understanding, from foundational concepts to specialized areas like risk financing, post-disaster recovery, and cross-cutting issues like health and gender.
- **f)** Cross-Sectoral and Multi-Stakeholder Engagement- Participants interact with officials from SDMAs, ATIs, NDRF, civil society, and academia, promoting peer learning and inter-institutional collaboration.
- g) Evaluation and Feedback Mechanism
 - Pre and Post-Training Assessments to measure knowledge acquisition.
 - Daily Feedback Sessions to recalibrate teaching methods and address participant concerns.
 - Final Review and Recommendations for sustaining and expanding DRM initiatives.



9.1. Details CALM Activities:

⇒ Yoga

The class will also incorporate laughter therapy to boost mood and reduce stress, offering a holistic approach to health and relaxation.

⇒ Cultural Evening

 Participants will engage in both individual and group cultural activities, proudly showcasing the diverse traditions, arts, and heritage of their respective states. These activities will foster cultural appreciation, encourage collaboration, and highlight the rich cultural tapestry within the group.

⇒ Movie review

 During the weekend, disaster management-related movies will be screened, followed by interactive class discussions. This approach will help participants deepen their understanding of disaster scenarios, response strategies, and human impacts through engaging visual storytelling, while encouraging critical reflection and dialogue.

⇒ Disaster Management Games

 Participants will be taught disaster management-related games designed to enhance their practical skills in a fun and interactive way. These games will help improve teamwork, quick decision-making, emergency communication, and problem-solving abilities essential for effective disaster response and preparedness.

12.Evaluation

At the end of the session participants will complete session-wise feedback. At the end of this training post-training evaluation to share their insights and assess the effectiveness of each session. Additionally, group presentations on their learnings will be conducted, allowing evaluation of how well participants have understood and applied the training content through collaborative reflection and knowledge sharing.

13. Expected Outcome

This training equips disaster management professionals and stakeholders with essential knowledge and practical skills to assess risks and develop inclusive disaster plans, focusing on protecting vulnerable groups such as children, women, the elderly, and persons with disabilities. Aligned with Indian DRM policies and the Sendai Framework, it enhances participants' ability to design context-sensitive, community-based disaster risk reduction strategies. Through interactive and experiential learning, participants will build resilience, foster collaboration with communities, and promote safety for all, especially marginalized groups in India's diverse disaster contexts.
